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Water and pads for schoolgirls

Learning and understanding –
Empowerment for life

The menstruation cycle is a shared life experience for women all over the globe.

What we take for granted, however, is often afflicted with shame and taboo in poor rural areas of Africa and Asia. The girls lack sufficient knowledge about menstrual health.

This can have dire consequences for schoolgirls. Inexpensive sanitary pads are difficult to obtain. To avoid being mobbed many schoolgirls hide at home during their period using dirty rags.

Absence from classes amount to 5 days per month consequently they must abandon school prematurely.

These adolescents are particularly at risk of sexual violence, undesired pregnancies and forced marriage.

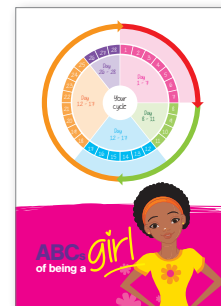
This was shown by research conducted by several IAW member organisations in different regions.
